Bradford School of Art played a fundamental role in the city's successful bid to be City of Culture in 2025. Bradford City of Culture 2025 is set to deliver over 1,000 performances and events rooted in the unique heritage and character of Bradford and its people.

We aim to boost the city's unique and growing creative and cultural sector by working closely with the region's creative industries, employers and arts organisations.

In recent years the School of Art has supported productions including The Duke, Peaky Blinders, Gunpowder, Girlfriends, The Syndicate and Ackley Bridge.

As recently as January 2020, students worked on set of The Duke (released February 2022). They supported make-up artists, worked in the costume department and as runners.



OUR HISTORY

Bradford College is celebrating almost two centuries of delivering quality education and training to the City of Bradford and its people.

Bradford College was founded in 1832 and opened in direct response to a need for the city's workers to have cutting-edge skills relevant to the workplace, and in particular, the local textiles industry.

The origins of the Faculty of the Bradford School of Art can be found with the opening of the School of Industrial Design and Art in 1863.

On June 23, 1882, the Prince and Princess of Wales (King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra) opened a new Technical School: art, textiles, engineering, construction, science, child welfare, teacher training, commercial enterprise and business were all part of the curriculum.

The Department of Art became a separate College of Art in 1904 and settled in the Mannville New Connection Chapel on Great Horton Road.

In 1911, Lord Rotherham opened Lister Building on Carlton Street, which is now home to the Bradford School of Art.

In September 1973, the Technical College and the Regional College of Art reunited to form a new college, the Bradford College of Art and Technology, in which the Bradford College of today has its roots.

Fine artist, sculptor, photographer and environmentalist **Andy Goldsworthy** studied at Bradford College of Art between 1974 and 1975.


Bassist with chart-topping rock band Franz Ferdinand **Bob Hardy** completed the Foundation in Art and Design course at Bradford College in 1999.


Award-winning director **Darly Goodrich** studied Graphic Design at Bradford Art College between 1984 and 1986.

One of Britain's most renowned artists in the 20th and 21st centuries (and painter, printmaker, photographer and stage designer) **David Hockney** joined Bradford Regional Art School in 1953, graduating with honours in 1957.

Acclaimed social documentary photographer **Ian Beesley** completed the Foundation in Art and Design course at Bradford Art College in 1974.





Contemporary artist **Ian Hodgson** graduated with a first-class honours degree in Fine Art from the Bradford School of Art. He won the Finest Drawing Prize in the UK's National Open Art Prize in 2013 for his piece 'Chrysalis' and was shortlisted for the Derwent Art Prize 2022. Ian has exhibited his work around the world, including Los Angeles where actress Demi Moore purchased one of his works.

Creative Director for Hallmark Cards plc **Jo Phillips** completed the Foundation in Art and Design course at Bradford College in 1991.

Cult dancer, mime artist, choreographer, actor and director **Lindsay Kemp** attended Bradford College of Art in the 1950s.

Award-winning children's author and illustrator **Mick Manning** studied the Foundation in Art and Design course at Bradford College in the late 1970s.

Composer, musician, sound designer, performer and artist **Nick Parkin** studied the Art Foundation course in the 1970s and then BA (Hons) Fine Art/Community Arts and Performance at Bradford College between 1980 and 1983.

Acclaimed artist and textile designer **Su Blackwell** graduated with a BA (Hons) Art & Design at Bradford College in 1997.

Writer and actress **Trish Cooke** graduated with a BA (Hons) Performing Arts degree after studying in the early 1980s.

Alexey Newton graduated in Music for the Creative Industries (BA Hons) with first-class honours in 2021. He is an established sound engineer and musician and has worked on Disney's stage adaptation of 'The Lion King' at the Alhambra in Bradford as well as shows for Andrew Lloyd Webber, the Royal Shakespeare Company and Frankie Boyle. Alexey also sings in his own band, Motherfungus.

Olivia Pentelow graduated in 2021 with a first-class honours degree in Performance. She starred in BBC drama, The Gallows Pole and also acted on Channel 4 school drama, Ackley Bridge and ITV drama, Ridley. Olivia is signed with United Agents, the UK's leading talent agency which also represents Olivia Coleman, James Corden, Dawn French, Tom Hardy and Ricky Gervais.

Neil Bedford graduated in Fashion Design and is now an internationally acclaimed photographer working with some of the biggest brands in the industry. Since leaving Bradford College, Neil has been commissioned to photograph some of the most well-known athletes, musicians, and actors of our times, including Pharrell Williams, Kobe Bryant, Ed Sheeran, George Ezra, Emma Raducanu, and David Beckham. He is also rock band Kasabian's official photographer.





OUR FACILITIES

The Bradford School of Art is located in the Lister Building on Carlton Street, just behind Bradford College's main campus, the David Hockney Building. This Grade II-listed building was completed in 1911 and was designed to replicate the workings of a real textiles mill, complete with a plant for dyeing and finishing of textiles.

A recent refurbishment created the Dye House Gallery exhibition space, as well as the adjacent Samuel Lister Café, fashion and textiles workshops and additional learning spaces.





THE DYE HOUSE GALLERY

Based in the Lister Building, the Dye House Gallery was formerly a full working dye house for the teaching of colouration and industrial dyeing processes. This space now hosts exhibitions and events throughout the year which are free of charge and open to both students and the public.

The gallery retains the charm of its origins as a dye house, making it an outstanding venue for art, performances, events, presentations and conferences.

Exhibitors include current students, alumni, academic members of staff and internationally known artists and photographers.

We have had the privilege of displaying the work of Joy Gregory, one of the most important artists to emerge from the Black British photography movement of the 1980s, and internationally respected photographer Tim Rudman, displaying work from his collection, 'Iceland, an Uneasy Calm.'





BRADFORD COLLEGE TEXTILE ARCHIVE

All students at the Bradford School of Art are given opportunities to access the Textile Archive to inform both creative practice and contextual studies projects.

You can take inspiration from the designs created and woven by textile students towards the end of the 19th century, and discover the technical processes involved in creating fabrics to a professional standard from the beautifully presented student workbooks.

The pattern books from the industry collections offer a glimpse into the fashions of the past: the tiny calico prints of the 1780s; the largescale bright designs of the 1850s crinoline fabrics; the new colours made possible through the development of the synthetic dye industry in the 19th century; the beautiful figured gauze fabrics of 1800; the development of synthetic fabrics in the early 20th century, and the kitsch designs of the 1950s.

Our special collections include both the 1860s and 1870s series of The Textile Manufacture of India, French trends services Les Tissus dating from 1882, Bilbille dating from 1910 and The Americas Collection of the 1940s and 1950s in addition to industry journals: The Wool Record and The Textile Manufacture from 1878.

FASHION AND TEXTILES WORKSHOPS

Our specialist fashion and textiles workshop facilities include industrial sewing machines, specialist machines, pattern cutting, industry standard mannequins and garment construction.

Specialist industrial embroidery machines, including Irish and Cornelly machines, are used widely across fashion and textiles courses. Pleating and embellisher machines are also popular with our students.

Constructed textiles workshops not only have traditional eight shaft weaving looms and our wonderful 'George Wood' floor looms dating back to the 1800s, but also include an industrial power jacquard loom and computerised Louet looms. Knitting machines cover a range of gauges, from fine to chunky knits and also have digital knit capabilities.

Our dedicated textile print room includes full length silkscreen printing facilities as well as dye mixing facilities. Our two digital textile printers also allow students across the art school to see their digital designs come to life, while wallpaper designs can also be printed to scale.

A large format laser cutter allows students to develop surface pattern and 3D ideas in a wide range of materials from plastics and paper to leather and textiles.

Specialist technicians work closely with students to support them in the technical aspects of their design projects and final collections.





SIOBHAN ULLAH PERFORMANCE SPACE

We named our largest performing arts space after one of our talented performing arts students, Siobhan Ullah, who sadly passed away in 2011 at the age of 18.

This performance space boasts a sprung dance floor, mirrors, full lighting rig and sound system and has the capacity to hold 125 guests, making it also an events venue for performances and showcases by our Music and Performing Arts students throughout the year, as well as our annual Fashion Show. Many of our events are open to the public.

HIGHER EDUCATION STUDENT COMMON ROOM

A dedicated common room for undergraduate students can be found on the ground floor of the Lister Building where they can relax and recharge. This bright and airy space with colourful furnishings is flooded by sunlight, making it the perfect place for students to take a break or meet up to discuss ideas.

We ensure that our students get plenty of opportunities to showcase their talents in real world settings. They take part in exhibitions, showcases, competitions and festivals across the country.

BA (Hons) Media Make-up with Special Effects for the Creative Industries

I wanted to find a Media Make-up with Special Effects course that was spread over three years.

After looking around, Bradford College was the only place able to give me the full experience. I was just completely drawn to the place, especially after having a look around. It just clicked.

The tutors were absolutely amazing, especially at the End of Year Show which was a brilliant experience. When I was in Second Year, I worked with a team of my classmates to do a runway look; that was brilliant, seeing my model walking down the runway with all my artwork.

It was the variety which I absolutely loved about the course; you might go into the course with a particular interest, but from this course you learn a whole bunch of other skills that I didn't think I'd be really interested in, such as wig-making.

I am now working at a company called Simbodies which works in the medical industry, making mannequins and prosthetics to help the NHS and the military. This degree absolutely equipped me for this job.

For anyone else considering a degree, I'd say to absolutely go for it. It's been a brilliant experience. I have no idea how fast the time has gone.

As a male graduate of Media Make-up with Special Effects, I'd say don't worry about stereotypes and what people might say.

You're going because you love what you do, and you want to learn and hone your craft.

BA Hons, Performance

There was so much that my Performance degree covered, from theatre to musicals, film and TV, to camera operations and being on screen. There were so many activities to get involved in and this degree gives people the careers edge they need to progress further into the industry, such as getting them on stage and noticed by organizations throughout Bradford.

Some of my favorite memories during my time at the Bradford School of Art include being part of a play with a casting director from outside the school. So, working with someone who we're not really used to; in the arts it's quite like that where you can work with different people every day.

Another fond memory is my final project, which was a musical theatre showcase. I'm a huge fan of musical theatre and have been doing it for a long time, so that's a special memory.

I'm currently a freelance theatre technician, but I've also got various acting jobs at Channel 4 and the BBC. I'm performing Shakespeare with another group of people in the South. I have had some impressive opportunities.

If anybody is wondering whether a degree in Performance is for them, I say give it a go, because if you don't, you're not going to know if it's for you.

Art & Design

Level 2 | Duration: 1 year

If you are obsessed with all things art and design and want to take that passion one step further, this course will test your creativity, allow you to explore different avenues of art and teach you the technical skills needed to develop and produce some impressive artwork.

You will have the opportunity to explore the materials, methods and processes that support art and design activities in a nurturing environment that will support your talents.

Units on this course include:

- ♦ Introduction to drawing skills
- Introduction to communication skills in art and design
- ♦ Solving 2D creative problems
- ♦ Solving 3D creative problems
- Developing and producing a personal project in art and design

From here you can progress onto a Level 3 course in art and design.

Creative Media Production

Level 2 | Duration: 1 year

Do you watch adverts, short films, animation or documentaries and think, "I would love to make something like that?" This is all possible with our Creative Media Production course which teaches you the broad range of skills associated with film, TV, radio and digital content.

You will get involved in practical sessions in:

- Cinematography (camera and lighting techniques)
- ♦ Sound production
- Post-production editing in sound and video

You will also take part in bootcamps, masterclasses and workshops in:

- ♦ Directing
- ♦ Film production
- ♦ Make-up and costume
- ♦ TV and broadcasting

We are proud partners with Screen Yorkshire's Connected Campus network which means you will gain access to employers in the region and beyond, giving you the opportunity to learn about careers and gain work experience.

From here you can progress onto a T-Level in Media, Broadcast and Production





Media Make-up with Special Effects

Level 2 | Duration: 1 year

Fancy a career as a make-up artist for TV, film, theatre, or fashion? A great place to start learning all the skills related to media make-up is our Level 2 Diploma in Media Make-up and Special Effects.

You will gain all the fundamental skills needed for progression on to further courses in this specialism and related employment in the industry.

These include:

- ♦ Character design
- ♦ Hair techniques
- ♦ Headdresses
- ♦ Make up for theatre performance
- ♦ Make-up for screen performance
- ♦ Mask-making
- ♦ Special effects techniques
- ♦ Wig skills exploration
- ♦ Simple prosthetics and much more.

You will leave this course being able to:

- ♦ Be on set to apply and redo make-up and hair
- ♦ Create special effects make-up
- ♦ Design and style hair for characters
- Remove make-up and maintain wigs and hairpieces
- Research and design make-up for characters
- Work to production designers' notes and instructions

Successful completion of this course can lead on to our Level 3 Diploma in Media Make-up with Special Effects.

Music Performance & Production

Level 2 | Duration: 1 year

This Level 2 Music Performance & Production course will provide you with a broad knowledge and skillset of the industry through a range of activities such as:

- ♦ Composition
- ♦ Band rehearsal techniques
- Delivery of a music performance and production
- ♦ Listening skills

You will gain all the basic technical skills required for a job in the music industry, from sound engineering to managing a music session and from performing to promoting music or theatre.

Successful completion of this course can lead on to the Level 3 Diploma in Music Performance & Production. You can also progress to further study or employment within the creative and music industries.

Performing & Production Arts

Level 2 | Duration: 1 year

This course is perfect for film, TV and theatre fans who are serious about a future in one of these industries. From singing to dancing and acting to directing, this Level 2 course provides the skills, knowledge and understanding required to progress on to further study in performing arts subjects.

You'll be introduced to a range of activities essential to the development and delivery of a performance such as:

- ♦ Drama
- ♦ Dance
- ♦ Music
- ♦ The production process
- ♦ The rehearsal process

These are just some of the units you will take:

- ♦ Introduction to performance
- \diamondsuit Introduction to production
- ♦ Staging a performance
- ♦ Communicating with an audience
- ♦ Personal project and presentation

Successful completion of this course can lead to employment within the production arts industry. If you choose further study, you may progress onto our Level 3 Performing & Production Arts course.



Art & Design

Level 3 | Duration: 2 years

If your next steps are an arts degree or employment in the arts industry, but you are still figuring out your specialism, this advanced course will guide you.

You will explore:

- ♦ 3D design
- ♦ Fashion and textile design
- ♦ Fine art
- ♦ Graphic design
- ♦ Interior design
- ♦ Photography

This course enables you to develop a critical and contextual awareness of different approaches in art and design.

By working with our specialist tutors in studios and workshops, you will be able to:

- Explore your ideas through practical application
- Research, analyse and evaluate information to develop creative outcomes
- ♦ Build a portfolio of professional work

Successful completion of the first year leads onto the Extended Diploma in the second year. From there, you can go straight into industry or progress on to a higher-level apprenticeship or university level study.

Fashion Design

Level 3 | Duration: 2 years

Our Level 3 in Fashion Design provides an exciting contemporary course for students interested in studying fashion at university level.

This course is delivered through inspirational projects covering a very wide range of themes specialising in all visual and technical aspects of fashion.

Working in our industry standard fashion and textiles workshops, you will explore, develop and test your creativity and learn vital technical skills such as:

- ♦ Design
- ♦ Fashion promotion
- ♦ Garment construction
- ♦ Pattern cutting
- At the end of the year, you will have the opportunity to exhibit your designs at our professional fashion show.

Upon successfully completing this course, you can go straight into industry, a higher-level apprenticeship, or progress onto university level study.





Media Make-up & Special Effects

Level 3 | Duration: 2 years

This specialist Media Make-up and Special Effects course will provide you with the fundamental skills needed for progression on to employment or university level study in this specialism.

There is the opportunity to explore an area of specialist study, allowing you to develop your own study programme centered around your interests and career ambitions.

This course is structured to provide you with a wide range of experience in key areas of your specialism. These include but are not limited to:

- ♦ Ageing for theatre
- ♦ Character design
- ♦ Colour techniques for performance
- ♦ Hair techniques
- ♦ Headdresses
- ♦ Introduction to period make-up and hair
- ♦ Mask making
- ♦ Simple prosthetics
- ♦ Special effects techniques
- ♦ Wig skills

You will leave this course being able to:

- ♦ Be on set to apply and redo make-up and hair
- ♦ Create special effects make-up
- ♦ Design and style hair for characters
- Remove make-up and maintain wigs and hairpieces
- ♦ Research and design make-up for characters
- Work to production designers' notes and instructions

Successful completion of the first year leads onto the Extended Diploma in the second year. From here, you can go straight into industry, a higher-level apprenticeship, or progress onto university level study.

Music Performance

Level 3 | Duration: 2 years

This two-year music course develops successful musicians and confident young people who are encouraged to be themselves in a creative and supportive community. This course is perfect if you are looking to go straight into the music industry or progress on to university level study in music and performing arts.

At Level 3 you will learn, develop and build on a variety of technical and creative skills and techniques such as:

- ♦ Composing
- ♦ Ear training
- ♦ Event management
- ♦ Live performance
- ♦ Live sound
- \diamondsuit Marketing and promotion
- ♦ Music business
- ♦ Music theory
- ♦ Music production
- ♦ Songwriting
- ♦ Studio recording

We believe in learning through real world experience. Our music students regularly release their own music through streaming platforms and have opportunities to perform to live audiences at music showcases and gig venues.

If you successfully complete the first year of this course, you will progress on to the Extended Diploma in the second year. You can go straight into employment with this qualification or progress on to a university degree.





Photography (specialist pathway)

Level 3 | Duration: 2 years

Have you always got your camera at the ready? Do you spot interesting scenes or angles and immediately whip out your phone? If you are passionate and serious about becoming a professional photographer, a specialist course in Photography is the pathway for you.

You will develop your creative and technical skills in photography, including the use of specialist equipment such as:

- ♦ Camera controls
- ♦ Lenses
- ♦ Photo editing software
- ♦ Photo-studio lighting

This course follows a themed projectbased approach to learning, enabling you to focus on nurturing your creativity.

Successful completion of the first year leads onto the Extended Diploma in the second year. From here, you can go straight into industry, a higher-level apprenticeship, or progress onto university level study.

Examples of this in the past have included film projects made abroad, documentary productions, animated films and music videos.

The media production facilities are of a professional standard, giving you access to both industry standard filming and editing equipment. Our fully equipped TV studio provides the opportunity to practice and experiment with the techniques you have been taught. There are four Apple Mac suites all equipped with the full Adobe Creative suite.

Course Overview

The Foundation Degree in Textiles Practice has been specifically developed for those wishing to develop professional practice in textile art, contemporary craft and designer-made products. The course will develop your technical skills in mixed media, stitch and constructed textiles, as well as focusing on researching ideas and developing original designs. Links between historical and contemporary practices in textiles will be made through guided research and individual practice.

The unique part-time course format has been designed for those from non-traditional learning routes and learners who need to organise study flexibly around other commitments.

You will develop both practical skills as well as the theory and knowledge to put your techniques into place.

During teaching blocks at college, teaching takes the form of group critiques with peers, seminars, group presentations, lectures, workshop inductions, practical demonstrations and hands-on practical activity. The curriculum is enriched by external study visits, trips and visiting speakers.

The on-site Bradford College Textile Archive is widely used for teaching and independent student research. Students also have access to industry-led talks and activities via our industry links with the Bradford Textile Society, and local art networks.

The BA (Hons) Fashion degree is designed to produce highly qualified 'employment ready' graduates who are able to play leading roles in a wide range of fashion-related careers. You will learn about fashion practice and sustainability, pattern cutting and garment construction, designing for industry, fashion communication and promotion, concept development and technology.

Course Overview

Our BA Hons in Special Effects for the Creative Industries course is multi-disciplinary. You will learn a variety of specialist practical and academic skills appropriate for various industry sectors and specialisms. This involves the understanding and evaluation of the different specialist contexts of makeup artistry in which you operate such as film, television, theatre, editorial, commercial, or fashion.

You will learn about the design development process and acquire a range of transferable skills, self-awareness and self-confidence, enabling the realisation of your individual potential, personal, social and professional development and strategies for professional practice and lifelong learning.

Through practical and theory learning you will be able to explore:

- ♦ Contextual makeup application (for differing genres)
- ♦ Hairstyling and setting
- ♦ Postiche and wig work
- ♦ Historical/period makeup and hairstyling
- ♦ Special effects makeup, i.e. casualty simulation, character, trauma

This Level 6 Top-up programme is designed to allow both students from a prior approved qualification and applicants with relevant experience to progress to an honours level degree.

The programme builds on your previous learning and experience, giving you the opportunity to produce work of a professional standard within your performing arts specialism. We focus on creating links with Yorkshire based companies and organisations, including Kala Sangam, Delius Arts Centre, Screen Yorkshire and Bradford Producing Hub.

The programme is delivered by experienced practicing Performing Arts professionals and academics who have a wide range of skills and relevant industry experience in TV, Film and Theatre. The programme prepares you for the reality of a challenging and competitive industry. It gives you a range of experiences and roles to fully prepare you for a portfolio career in the Performing Arts.

You will have the opportunity to work collaboratively across different disciplines, creating a professional and vocational experience. For example, this could include music, film, and media make-up students on film projects.

Students in their final year will perform in a 'Showcase' which they plan and organise and invite industry professionals. This potentially gives students the opportunity to meet and perform in front of agents and casting directors as well as other industry contacts, possibly in an external venue.

BA (Hons) Textiles Practice (Top-up)

Level 6

Duration: 2 years part-time

Entry Requirements: 80 UCAS tariff points

Course Overview

BA (Hons) Textiles Practice is a part-time top-up programme providing a specialist Level 6 progression route for students on FdA Textiles Practice, as well as those with other relevant Level 5 qualifications wishing to complete an honours degree. The unique part-time, blended learning model allows students to balance study with other commitments, as well as the opportunity for learners from across the UK to study with us.

The programme comprises a blend of theoretical and practice-based learning, focussed on textiles in art, craft and design. Modules are delivered over two-years, part-time, 60 credits per year. Students will usually attend college for five long weekends per year, with online tutorial support between teaching blocks. At Level 6, the emphasis is on identifying areas of specific interest in relation to individual textile practice.

In Year 1, students will be supported in choosing subjects to explore through in-depth critical research, creative investigation and textile exploration. Students may choose to work with traditional fibres, fabrics and processes, digital skills, unconventional materials or a combination of media and techniques. Alongside the textiles and research modules, students will also develop professional skills through practical and professional experiences.

In Year 2, students will focus on a Major Project, which will be a self-identified area of textiles practice, culminating in a body of resolved textile outcomes. To enhance professional skills, students will also learn how to present and promote their work, with the programme culminating in a professional exhibition of work.

MEET MARY WHITEHOUSE

Textiles Practice student Mary Whitehouse, received a commendation in the 2023 Clothworkers Prize for Interiors

Mary Whitehouse, a mature student from York, received her commendation in the Clothworkers Prize 2023 interiors category, thanks to a stunning piece of weaving suitable for interior use.

A student on our Foundation Degree in Textiles Practice, she held no previous art education before enrolling at the Bradford School of Art and was actually an experienced physicist before retiring.

"When I retired from physics education, I did a patchwork and quilting course and absolutely loved it. I realised that I didn't just want to make patterns out of magazines, I wanted to learn how to design things myself."

"I was on a day course and the tutor had done the degree course here with Hannah Lamb, and she said I'd love it! Hannah's a great teacher; I phoned her and asked if I was too old or too late, but she invited me to come for an interview. She asked if I wanted to be challenged, which I did, and here I am."

"The teachers have such a depth of knowledge and are practising textile artists themselves; this brings such a rich experience and makes it really special."

"You're working in the Lister Building, with all its history, and using the in-house textile archive gives you that feeling. It gives a real depth to what you can do. There's such a variety of materials and students can chose hugely different things as our inspiration. Of course, it's also nice to be in the place where David Hockney started!"

The imagination behind Mary's piece of artistry came from the unique Bradford Textile Archive.

"We're really fortunate here to have the Bradford Textile Archive available for us to use and the piece I used was in a sample book from the John Knox Mill, formerly based in Bradford."

"The page I chose has fabrics woven for Jaeger and Garigue, which particularly caught my eye. I loved the colours on the page and it brought back a lot of memories, as my mother was a seamstress, and she would buy this sort of cloth on the market."

Programme lead, Hannah Lamb, commented on Mary's achievements and the opportunities available on the programme: "We were delighted to hear about Mary's success. She is an exceptionally dedicated and hardworking student, who consistently goes above and beyond in her studies and as an ambassador for the course. It's a real credit to our course that we manage to successfully compete alongside BA and Masters students from far bigger institutions."

"The part-time course Mary does is a unique blend, combining study on campus with distance learning. Students typically come from non-traditional routes and many combine their studies with part-time work or caring responsibilities. Throughout the course, students have many opportunities to gain professional experience with external projects, exhibitions and competitions like this."

MEET OUR TEXTILES PRACTICE PROGRAMME LEAD, HANNAH LAMB

Among our stellar cast of lecturers at the Bradford School of Art is Hannah Lamb, Programme Lead for our Foundation Degree and Bachelor of Arts in Textiles Practice, textile artist, and author of Poetic Cloth: Creating Meaning in Textile Art.

She holds a BA (Hons) Embroidery (2001) and MA Textiles (2010) from Manchester Metropolitan University and is a member of the 62 Group of Textile Artists, in addition to lecturing at the Bradford School of Art for nearly 20 years.

She works with a range of textile processes, including stitch, print and fabric manipulation, creating textile artworks from an intimate scale to larger installation works and has had her work exhibited nationally and internationally.

What was your journey to becoming a textile artist and lecturer in textile practice?

As a child I was really interested in anything creative and grew up in a family where people made things and were resourceful. My grandparents were part of the wartime generation that made do and mend, and my mum made clothes for me. Everybody around me made things and so there was always fabric and scissors and pins on the table.

I was lucky that when I was at secondary school we had a really great art department and I didn't realize at the time, but they really opened up possibilities for me, because rather than it being a standard art department where you just do painting and drawing, we were able to do ceramics, textiles, metal work and all kinds of craft-based practices within our GCSE and A-Level.

So, it was a natural progression. I went onto college where I did a foundation course. I then studied at Manchester Metropolitan University and became a practicing artist, and alongside that, I've been teaching.

I was always interested in the idea of teaching, so I did a very short teaching placement at a school while I was still studying at university, but at the same time, I was also desperate to practice because I had been in education for a very long time.

I spent a little bit of time working as a freelance artist and I got some really great opportunities off the back of my graduation, going to New Designers, which is a big graduate show, so I was able to start exhibiting work. I got some great opportunities to exhibit work fairly early on and then I was selected by the Crafts Council for the Setting up Scheme.

I was selected for a two-year placement with the Crafts Council, based at Coventry University and I was based there as a maker in residence, doing my studio practice.

At that point I was making work and selling it to big department stores around the world and I was exhibiting in some really high-profile exhibitions and contemporary craft fairs in the UK.

I got a little bit of teaching experience at Coventry and while there I applied for my job at Bradford College, which I started in 2004.

What have been your fondest memories and most exciting opportunities with your students?

We've had some brilliant opportunities and I feel incredibly privileged to have been able to do some of the things that I've done. Some of the study visits we've done with students have been amazing, such as taking students to New York and Paris.

We've had some really lovely local study visits as well, such as going to see local textile mills, so I've had this brilliant induction into the textile industry locally and the heritage as well.

In terms of stand-out memories, in addition to maybe trying not to lose people on the Paris Metro or New York Subway, we have had excellent exhibition opportunities and we've done some brilliant live projects in collaboration with local industry.

These fantastic opportunities seem to really stay with students as well. We had a study visit to London and for months afterwards, students will reference the exhibition they saw at the Tate Modern.

We saw these enormous textile sculptures that were breath-taking in terms of the

scale and the ambition of them, and I think that really made the students go 'wow, this is what you can do with textiles.'

What have been some of your own career highlights as a textile artist?

I think one of the big ones was probably being accepted into the 62 Group of Textile Artists. They are an exhibiting group based in the UK, but with a membership that goes worldwide.

What was brilliant about that was I had heard so much about the 62 Group. It's legendary really; it is the longest established textile art group in the UK and when I was studying my lecturers were members. It was something that was mentioned in our lectures. So then to be able to be accepted into the group myself, I was like, I don't know if I dare stand amongst all these great people. It was a really lovely moment. It was a rubber stamp of approval that I'm doing the right things and I'm on the right track.

How does your experience as an artist inform your teaching?

I think my experience as an artist is completely fundamental to teaching. As a student my lecturers at university were all practicing artists and they constantly brought that into their teaching, and I do that without even thinking about it.


If it's something as simple as a student stuck with their work, they don't know how to progress it or they can't think of what to do next, I can empathize with that, because that's what I'm doing day-to-day in my studio and I try to give them some tools that I know work for me, so I'm giving them the tools that I use every day.

Because I am a practicing artist, I have networks which I share with my students. I'm engaged with local networks and arts organizations, and I can bring us all together. We can set up exhibition opportunities for the students and we can bring in people we know to be visiting speakers.

The other thing is that if you're a creative practitioner and you're teaching, while you're teaching and engaging with the students, it's enriching your own practice as well

For some courses, you may require additional qualifications, evidence of related work experience, a portfolio of evidence, a health check, or Disclosure Barring Service (DBS) clearance.

Applications for full-time undergraduate, foundation degree and degree courses at Bradford College should be made through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) website.

Advanced Learner Loan

For Access to HE (Level 3) courses only.

The Advanced Learner Loan is a government-funded loan that is easy to apply for, doesn't take your household income into account, and doesn't involve a credit check.

You will need to pay your loan back when:

- ♦ You have finished your course
- ♦ You earn more than £25,000.

To qualify for the Advanced Learner Loan you must be:

- Studying at an approved college or training provider. Bradford College is an approved centre
- ♦ 19 years of age or older on the first day of your course

- ♦ Studying a full- or part-time Further Education qualification at Level 3 or above
- A UK resident or a UK national, or have 'settled status' (this means there are no restrictions on how long you can stay)
- ♦ A resident in the UK for three years or more.
